Ideas & Content

There are four key pieces to improving the ideas and content of your writing. They are:

- 1. Selecting an idea (topic)
- 2. Narrowing the idea (focus)
- 3. Elaborating on the idea (development)
- 4. Discovering the best information to convey the idea (details)
- 1. Selecting an Idea (Topic)

There are many ways a person may go about selecting a topic:

- Free writing- simply write down anything that you may want to use as your topic. No limits, no rules.
- Flashback- use old journals, photographs, souvenirs, or anything else that evokes memories and feelings.
- Favorite places- make a list of places you enjoy and use them as the setting.
- Prompts- use teacher given prompts, or find a book or list of prompts on the Internet.
- Corral- keep a list of interesting topics, ideas, events, stories, etc. Then refer back to this list for inspiration when trying to find a topic.

Once the topic has been chosen, you should brainstorm everything you know about the topic. It does not matter if it is correct or not. Since this is simply a tool for getting the ideas flowing, there are no limits here. Corrections can be done later.

- 2. Narrowing the Idea (Focus)
 - R.A.F.T.S. is an acronym for:
 - R- role of the writer- decide on point of view and voice
 - A- *audience* know the target group
 - F- format- how will the information be presented
 - T- *topic* zero in on main ideas and focus
 - **S** *strong verb* directs writer to purpose (persuade, create, predict, compare, defend, analyze, inform)
- 3. Elaborating on the Idea (Development)
 - Ask a question- share an idea, story, or piece of information with a classmate and then have him or her ask three questions about your topic. This will help you see where you left gaps.
 - Outline- create an outline of your topic. Make it a bare bones outline first, then add to the original until the details and information are complete.
 - 5Ws & H- Who, what, when, where, why, and how. Check to see how many are represented and needed in your writing.
- 4. Discovering the Best Information (Details)
 - © Show Me, Don't Tell Me- take a statement that is nonspecific and turn it into a detailed and unique statement. Have others help you identify these statements.
 - © **Observe Closely** look at your surroundings and record all the minute details. Dig deep to use all of your senses. You may need to take a mental trip to help you.
